



◆ **STEALING BEAUTY** Wild Ginger used to display business cards in these handmade solid bamboo serving vessels—until sticky-fingered customers kept swiping them from the hostess stand. We found the coveted tray, made by local artist Peter Gallagher, in a Capitol Hill shop and paired it with these fused-glass plates by Susanna Prince (also a Seattle artist) and embellished chopsticks—an eclectic, one-of-a-kind sushi set too pretty to keep under wraps. ◆ **TICKLED PINK** Lighten up a little with International Fashion Machines' (ifmachines.com) Pom Pom dimmers—soft, fuzzy sensor balls attached to mod, fabric-covered switch plates that let you adjust your lighting with the tickle of a pompom. Seattle designer Margaret Orth's funky dimmers transform the banal activity of turning on a light into a sensory experience. \$129 at **Retrofit Home** (1419 12th Ave.; 206.227.7826; retrofithome.com).



◆ **MELTING POT** Add a touch of sparkle—and a sense of history—to your holiday finery this season. Discovered in France and brought stateside by Capitol Hill distributor Potluck Paris (potluckparis.com), this twinkling Swarovski crystal, sterling silver and pewter bracelet is made from melted vintage metal products such as Parisian teapots and flatware.
